The Corroboree is a vital link in keeping traditional culture alive, and invigorates the spirit of the land. It is strongly supported by the Wollombi community, and presents an opportunity to share Indigenous culture with Indigenous and non-Indigenous people alike. It aims to promote this connection with culture and with the spirit of the land itself.

The <u>Alice Moyle Lecture</u> is an invited annual lecture on a matter related to sound and audiovisual materials and Indigenous collections. Inaugurated in 2002, it has been held annually at ASRA conferences in honour of Dr Alice Moyle (1908-2005), one of the founders of ASRA, and a seminal figure in Ethnomusicology in Indigenous Australia.
