The School of Music houses an archive of performance recital tape recordings spanning 50 years. 'RePlayed' consolidates the School's links with the National Film and Sound Archive, bringing together music, sound, education and archiving expertise into a collaborative venture that aims to begin the digitisation of the School's performance history. Beyond the Wire, Behind the Garage - the War Memorial's Oral History & Portrait Commission

The War Memorial's portrait and oral history commission is a project unique in the history of the Memorial. Undertaken over a period of nearly two years, the project sought to gain an unprecedented level of insight into the Australian military, or rather, the lives and experiences of current serving men and women of today's defence forces, by interviewing and photographing them before, during, and after their respective deployments overseas. The resulting body of work comprises several hundred photographs and over 60 hours of recorded interview, which were recorded on military bases both at home and overseas, and in domestic residences all around Australia. Stephanie Boyle, who was one of the two interviewers involved, will discuss the experience and the process of the project.

Australians at War Oral History Digitisation: Current Transcription Practices and Emerging Technologies

Recently DAMsmart digitised 11,000 hours of war veteran interviews from all major conflicts in Australian modern history. In addition, DAMsmart created and delivered a Media Asset Management system populated with the digitised records for delivery to the Australian Defence Force Academy. The commissioned system tailored by DAMsmart brings together existing information and oral history transcription data into one media rich asset management system. In this presentation Andrew Martin will explore the digitisation process, challenges and achievements in building a turnkey media/archive system, and explore new technologies that will open up the search and find capabilities of media archives.

Making Oral History Meaningful to the Community

The practice of curating oral histories lags behind the practice of creating them" (MacKay, 2007, p.22). Current oral history practice tends to focus on the act of doing and accumulating historical data rather than producing audible, publically accessible, historical artefacts. Treated as written material within archives oral history's unique contribution to public memory has been left untapped (Frisch, 2004, p.111). This paper explores two potential benefits of integrating audio practices from the fields of sound media and sound art.
